CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



Drugs Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non-criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2 Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

Property Crime Violations This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

Statutes & Acts Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.


Traffic Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

Violent Crimes The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

CSO MEDIA RELATIONS MARCH / APRIL 2022

Objectives of the CSO/Media Relations

- Distribute media releases in relation to the BIG4 corporately driven driving behaviours; impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving and lack of seatbelt use.
- Seek community involvement by utilizing media releases with regard to property crimes such as break and enter, theft, mischief, drugs and wanted persons; with proven success.
- Engage with community partners to deliver educational programs on topics such as fraud, internet safety, youth and the law and drug awareness.
- Work collaboratively with the Lambton Crime Unit, Community Street Crimes Unit, Operational Analyst and Sarnia-Lambton Crime Stoppers.
- Use social media to help promote upcoming OPP events
- Work closely with the Auxiliary Unit to assist in any upcoming events

NUMBER OF TARGETED MEDIA RELEASES:

A total of **29 media releases** were distributed for the month of **March**.

A total of **20 media releases** were distributed for the month of **April**.

PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:

- The month of March is designated as Fraud Prevention month and, as such, a social media post was added about safe internet marketplace deals.
- On April 19 the Village of Point Edward re-dedicated the Cenotaph, marking 100 years of the memorial in the village. Members of Lambton OPP and the CSO attended the service to represent and provide traffic control for the event. A social media post was added regarding this event.
- The CSO has been extremely active in both the Lambton Kent Public Schools and Catholic Schools in the area, conducting 27 presentations for the month of March and 29 presentations for the month of April from the OPP KIDS program to grades 6/7.

OTHER NEWS

- The Lambton CSO has been providing content to the Sarnia Lambton Crime Stoppers to showcase crime in the area with their "Crime of the Week" segment both on the SLCS website and radio broadcasts weekly.
- The Lambton CSO has been actively building and improving relationships with local, regional and international news outlets through email correspondence and phone interviews.
- The Lambton CSO attended a charity hockey game at the Progressive Auto Arena where members of Lambton OPP played against the Criminal Justice students of Lambton College. A total of \$400 was raised for victim services.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS OVERVIEW

MARCH / APRIL 2022

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during March and April. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including: Law, Drug abuse, Youth bullying, social media awareness and safety.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period in regards to youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions.

The SRO began teaching the OPP K.I.D.S program in several elementary schools during the month of April.

March 2022

Point Edward – A youth took her parents vehicle without consent and then crashed the vehicle into a fence demolishing the vehicle. The youth driver and 3 other occupants fled the scene. Police identified the youth driver and she was charged with a criminal code offence.

Alvinston – A 10 year old youth brought a knife to the local park and was banishing it. The youth was spoken to and warned.

Petrolia - 4 youths were caught driving through the parking lot at the high school with 3 of the youths in the back of a pickup truck. All youths spoken to and warned.

Petrolia – A 17 year old youth was assaulted by a 15 year old youth during the school lunch hour in Petrolia. The 15 year old youth had previous warnings therefore was arrested and charged under the Criminal Code of Canada.

Watford – A 16 year old youth was caught stealing a bottle of liquor from the LCBO. The youth was charged Under the Criminal Code of Canada.

Point Edward – Several youth's ages 13 to 15 were caught shooting BB guns in an unsafe manner. Youths spoken to and diverted.

Wyoming – A 12 year old youth was caught with Cannabis at school, the youth was suspended from school and warned by police.

There were 4 occurrences in the month of March with youth and suicidal thoughts and or attempts

There were 4 motor vehicle collisions during the Month of March involving 16 and 17 year old youths.

April 2022

Petrolia – 2 youths were caught writing on a person's car in mustard. Both youths were spoken to and diverted.

Plympton – A 14 year old youth assaulted a younger student at school. The youth was diverted to the Rebound program.

Thedford - A 14 year old youth assaulted another student at school. The youth was diverted to the Rebound program

Corunna – 3 youths ages 13 and 14 were caught attempting to gain access to a home owners garden shed. Two of the youths were found to be intoxicated by alcohol. All youths spoken to and brought home to parents.

Petrolia – A 14 year old youth made utter death threats to an adult. The youth has been arrested and charged under the Criminal Code of Canada.

Corunna - A 14 year old assaulted his mother. Youth was arrested and diverted.

Forest – Several youth were involved in an altercation which lead to two 15 year old youths pulling out pocket knives and holding them in a threating manner towards a youth victim. Both youths were arrested and charged under the Criminal Code of Canada.

Petrolia – 4 youths aged 15 to 17 were driving in the town of Petrolia with the vehicles exhaust dragging along the road. The vehicle was stopped by police and the occupants were found to be consuming alcohol. Two of the occupants were charged under the Liquor License Act.

Petrolia – Two groups of youths ages 14 to 16 were in the town of Petrolia and there have been ongoing issues between the two groups. During this occurrence the youths were involved in an altercation which lead to 1 youth purchasing a dozen eggs and "egging" the other group's house. The opposite youth then responded by grabbing a brick and chasing after the youth. All youths were spoken to and warned.

Grand Bend – Robbery – Two male youths were following a male pedestrian. The two male youths assaulted the pedestrian several times and then stole property from the pedestrian in the value of approximately \$270. Both youths were arrested and charged under the criminal code of Canada.

Petrolia - Numerous complaints of youths driving at a high rate of speed on Tank Street. A 17 year old youth was locked in on Radar travelling 107km/hr in a 50km/hr zone. The youth was charged with Stunt driving under the Highway Traffic Act and the vehicle he was driving was impounded for 14 days.

There were 2 occurrences in the month of April with youth and suicidal thoughts and or attempts

There were 2 motor vehicle collisions during the Month of April involving 16 and 17 year old youths.

CRIME – MARCH / APRIL 2022

- Members of the Lambton County Crime Unit continue with a Cold Case historic death investigation
- Crime members actively investigating an unsolved homicide on the Kettle & Stoney Point First Nation
- Crime Unit is involved in a multi-jurisdictional homicide. Multiple Arrests and warrants executed across the province. Additional accused parties were located and arrested
- Crime Unit still investigating baby death in Courtright
- Crime continues to investigate the double homicide that occurred at the end of December 2021
- 8 sexual assaults reported. 3 resulted in charges being laid, 1 was dealt with through other means due to age of accused, 2 resulted in the Victim declining to have charges laid. 1 was unfounded and 1 is still ongoing
- Lambton had 13 sudden death in the months of March/April 2022 2 of which were suspected overdose deaths that Crime assisted with
- Lambton Crime is involved in a missing person investigation which CIB has assigned and the investigation is ongoing
- Lambton Crime are investigating the murder of a 45 year old male found deceased in the Township of Enniskillen
- There was an Indecent Act occurrence in Petrolia where charges were laid
- There was an Indecent Act occurrence in Point Edward that is still under investigation at this time
- A robbery occurred at the Tim Hortons in Watford resulting in an adult female being arrested and charged
- A robbery occurred in Grand Bend where an 18-year-old adult and a youth were charged as a result of the investigation

COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT MARCH/APRIL

- During the months of March & April 2022 Lambton CSCU investigated 25 occurrences
- Lambton CSCU members laid a total of 44 charges
- Lambton CSCU wrote 5 warrants, for drug and property investigations. The unit completed 2 warrant service entries
- Lambton CSCU conducted an extensive investigation into numerous B&E's, Thefts in Lambton County and surrounding area. Lambton CSCU located and arrested a male in possession of approximately 110,000 worth of stolen goods. The male was further linked to several other investigations. At this time Lambton CSCU have recovered approx \$900,000 worth of stolen goods. Most of these goods have been returned to their rightful owners. The male has been charged with 32 offences. This is a multi-jurisdictional investigation which Lambton CSCU have taken the lead, sharing information and partnering with other police services to ensure a fulsome investigation is completed
- Lambton CSCU executed a S.11 CDSA Search Warrant on Walpole Island in relation to the State of Emergency issued by Walpole Island First Nation. Persons arrested: 2 Charges: 14. Seized small quantities of Fentanyl, Hydromorphone, & Psilocybin (Mushrooms). Other charges included unlawful weapons, and possession of stolen goods
- Lambton CSCU conducted a property crimes investigation into stolen side by side ATV and stolen trailers. Persons arrested: 1 Charges: 6. Property returned to owners
- Lambton CSCU assisted Lambton Crime Unit with a Homicide Investigation. Lambton CSCU processed all drugs and laid appropriate drug charges associated to the investigation
- Lambton CSCU continues to assist Walpole Island Police Service with intelligence gathering related to drug trafficking pertaining to the State of Emergency issued as a result of the high number of opioid drug related overdoses
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis

- When calling the detachment at the above numbers you will receive an automated greeting.
- Press 1 if you need to report an incident or speak with an officer, this will transfer you to call taking
- **Press 2** if you wish to speak with the administrative personnel during the above noted business hours. After hours you may leave a non-urgent message that will be followed-up on the next business day. Do not leave a request for assistance message

<u>OUTSIDE PHONE</u> * If you attend an office and the doors are locked or it is after hours – please pick up the phone outside of the detachment and you will be connected directly to the OPP Communications

CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:

You have the option to report select occurrences to the OPP from your computer or mobile device using the OPP's <u>Citizen Self Reporting</u> system.

Use this system to report:

- 1. Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- 2. Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- 3. Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- 4. Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
- 5. Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
- 6. Theft under \$5,000
- 7. Driving Complaint

FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
