# CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



**Drugs** Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

**Drug Possession** Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

**Operational** calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non-criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

**Operational 2** Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

**Property Crime Violations** This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

**Statutes & Acts** Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

**Traffic** Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.


**Violent Crimes** The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

# **Community Safety / Media Relations**

## May and June 2022

## Objectives of the CSO/Media Relations

- Distribute media releases in relation to the BIG4 corporately driven driving behaviours; impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving and lack of seatbelt use.
- Seek community involvement by utilizing media releases with regard to
  property crimes such as break and enter, theft, mischief, drugs and wanted
  persons; with proven success.
- Engage with community partners to deliver educational programs on topics such as fraud, internet safety, youth and the law and drug awareness.
- Work collaboratively with the Lambton Crime Unit, Community Street Crimes Unit, Operational Analyst and Sarnia-Lambton Crime Stoppers.
- Use social media to help promote upcoming OPP events
- Work closely with the Auxiliary Unit to assist in any upcoming events

#### **NUMBER OF TARGETED MEDIA RELEASES:**

A total of **23 media releases** were distributed for the month of **May**. A total of **31 media releases** were distributed for the month of **June**.

#### **PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:**

- May 13<sup>th</sup> was designated as 'Drug Drop-Off Day' throughout the region and, as such, messaging was posted to encourage people to drop off expired or no-longer-needed medications at local pharmacies.
- The Victoria Day weekend is always a busy time for Lambton OPP, and messaging was posted throughout the week, leading up to the weekend. Messaging included zero-tolerance for alcohol infractions, safe boating/lifejackets and high police presence in the area.
- The CSO has been extremely active in both the Lambton Kent Public Schools and Catholic Schools in the area, conducting 19 presentations for the month of May and 8 presentations for the month of June from the OPP KIDS program to grades 6/7.
- The CSO has also been engaged to present to local scout troops in Watford about bullying and a bike safety presentation for kids at Klondike Trailer park.

#### **OTHER NEWS**

- The Lambton CSO has been providing content to the Sarnia Lambton Crime Stoppers to showcase crime in the area with their "Crime of the Week" segment both on the SLCS website and radio broadcasts weekly.
- The Lambton CSO has been actively building and improving relationships with local, regional and international news outlets through email correspondence and phone interviews.
- The CSO has also been actively posting about traffic backups or closures on Hwy 402, in attempt to warn travellers and prevent 'end of cue' collisions.

# SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS OVERVIEW

# **MAY / JUNE 2022**

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during May and June. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions.

#### **May 2022**

Courtright – A 17-year-old youth had over 50 of her friends over for a party. Police were called due to noise issues. A parent was notified of the incident and party was dispersed

Petrolia – a report of a disturbance of youth was reported on Petrolia line during the high school lunch hour. Police patrolled the area and dispersed the crowd. It appeared a fight was about to occur. A 15-year-old youth continued to yell obscenities at pedestrians including the local high school principal. As a result, the youth was arrested and later released

Point Edward – A group of youth were attempting to steal items and were confronted by the owner. Upon being confronted one youth threatened the owner with a knife and then banished what appeared to be a handgun. The youth was later arrested and charged with 8 Criminal Code Charges

Petrolia – A group of youth were found to be bullying a female youth online. Included in the bullying were death threats. As a result of the investigation seven youths' ages 13 to 15 were diverted to the Lambton County Rebound program

Petrolia – A 14-year-old youth assaulted another teenage youth. The subject youth was diverted to the Sarnia Lambton Rebound program

Corunna – A break and enter occurred to a pharmacy in Corunna. A canine track was conducted and as a result of the investigation a youth has been identified as a suspect. The investigation is still ongoing

There were 2 occurrences in the month of May with youth and suicidal thoughts and or attempts

There were 5 motor vehicle collisions during the Month of May involving 16 and 17 youths

#### **June 2022**

Grand Bend – Numerous youths were found one evening on a front lawn of a residence and were of various levels of intoxication. The youths parents were notified and youths returned home

Grand Bend – There were several calls for service involving youth in the Grand Bend related to alcohol offences

Point Edward - A 17 year old youth called police and advised that she was a victim of human trafficking. The youth received help and the investigation is ongoing

PETROLIA, ON - A 16-year-old from Plympton-Wyoming has been arrested and charged with Uttering Threats and Mischief following an incident that took place at Lambton Central Collegiate and Vocational Institute (LCCVI) High School in Petrolia last week. On Thursday, June 2, 2022 Lambton County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to the high school to investigate a threatening message that had been scrawled in one of the washrooms. An investigation was conducted by Lambton County OPP School Resource Officer (SRO) with assistance from members of the Lambton County OPP Crime Unit and Forensic Identification Services. As a result of the investigation police were able to identify and arrest the accused. The youth has been released from custody and is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice-Sarnia at a later date

There were 9 occurrences in the month of June with youth and suicidal thoughts and or attempts

There were 4 motor vehicle collisions during the Month of June involving 16- and 17-year-old youths

# **COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT MAY/JUNE**

- During the months of May & June 2022 Lambton CSCU investigated 14 occurrences.
- Lambton CSCU members laid a total of 45 charges
- Lambton CSCU wrote 11 warrants, for drug and property investigations. The unit completed 4 warrant service entries
- Lambton CSCU had reasonable grounds to conducted a traffic stop on a drug trafficker. Persons arrested: 1 – Charges: 2. Seized 136 Hydromorph Contin 9 mg pills & 84 Dilaudid 8 mg pills. Two cellphones seized. Party charged with Possession of the Purpose of Trafficking. Seizure value approx \$4400.00
- Lambton CSCU executed a S.11 CDSA Search Warrant on Walpole Island in relation to the State of Emergency issued by Walpole Island First Nation. Persons arrested: 3 – Charges: 20. Seized 22 grams of Methamphetamine, small quantities of Fentanyl, Cocaine, Hydromorphone, Steroids & Psilocybin (Mushrooms). Several charges of Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking as well as, possession of stolen goods & fail to comply with release order. Lambton CSCU was able to return those stolen goods to their rightful owners
- Lambton CSCU assisted Chatham Kent Police Service Drug Unit with warrant entry on target trafficking to south Lambton and Walpole Island residents. Approx 37 grams of Cocaine, 12 grams of Methamphetamine and \$3500 in cash seized. One party charged.
- Lambton CSCU assisted PJFCET (Provincial Joint Force Cannabis Enforcement Team) with warrant entry and search of large indoor illegal Cannabis grow in Essex County. Over 60,000 plants located at this grow
- Lambton CSCU continues to assist Lambton Crime Unit with several Homicide Investigations, in various capacities
- Lambton CSCU continues to assist Walpole Island Police Service with intelligence gathering related to drug trafficking pertaining to the State of Emergency issued as a result of the high number of opioid drug related overdoses
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis.
- Lambton CSCU assisted with writing a warrant in relation to a fatal motor vehicle collision investigation on Walpole Island

# **MAJOR CRIME UNIT - MAY / JUNE 2022**

- Members of the Lambton County Crime Unit continue with a Cold Case historic death investigation
- Crime members actively investigating an unsolved homicide on the Kettle & Stoney
   Point First Nation
- Crime Unit is involved in a multi-jurisdictional homicide. Multiple Arrests and warrants executed across the province. Additional accused parties were located and arrested
- Crime Unit still investigating baby death in Courtright
- Crime continues to investigate the double homicide that occurred at the end of December 2021
- Lambton Crime is actively investigating the 1st degree murder investigation that occurred at Marthaville Conservation
- Lambton Crime Unit and Safe Streets are assisting Walpole Police with a double fatal MVC. Ongoing
- 8 sexual assaults reported. 1 resulted in charges being laid, 4 was dealt with insufficient evidence to proceed, 3 resulted in the Victim declining to have charges laid
- Lambton had 11 sudden deaths in the months of May/June 2022 2 of which were investigated by the Lambton Crime Unit. 1 suspected overdose and other in relation to domestic
- Lambton Crime is involved in a missing person investigation which CIB has assigned and the investigation is ongoing
- Lambton Crime was involved in a human trafficking investigation in Point Edward.
   Female wouldn't provide any information in relation to being Human Trafficked. All services provided to the victim
- Lambton OPP continue to field calls related to elder abuse and the ongoing scams that are circulating. Media involved making people aware of these scams and not to get involved

#### **CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:**

You have the option to report select occurrences to the OPP from your computer or mobile device using the OPP's <u>Citizen Self Reporting</u> system.

Use this system to report:

- 1. Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- 2. Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- 3. Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- 4. Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
- 5. Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
- 6. Theft under \$5,000
- 7. Driving Complaint

#### FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
