CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



Drugs Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non- criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2 Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

Property Crime Violations This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

Statutes & Acts Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

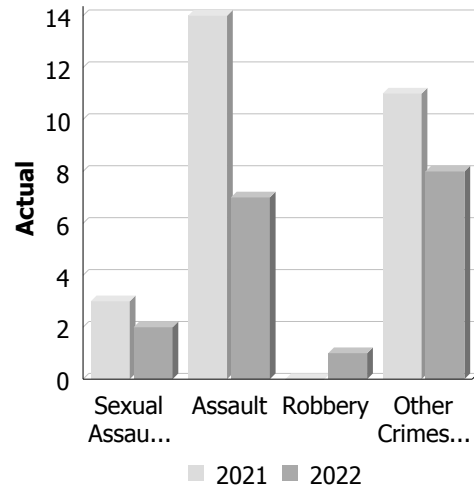
Traffic Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

Violent Crimes The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

COMMUNITY SAFETY / MEDIA RELATIONS - NOVEMBER / DECEMBER 2022

OBJECTIVES OF THE CSO / MEDIA RELATIONS

- Distribute media releases in relation to the BIG4 corporately driven driving behaviours; impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving and lack of seatbelt use.
- Seek community involvement by utilizing media releases with regard to property crimes such as break and enter, theft, mischief, drugs and wanted persons; with proven success.
- Prepare and distribute media releases in relation to major incidents throughout Lambton County.
- Work collaboratively with the Lambton Crime Unit, Community Street Crimes Unit, Operational Analyst and Sarnia-Lambton Crime Stoppers.
- Use social media to help promote upcoming OPP events
- Work closely with the Auxiliary Unit to assist in any upcoming events

NUMBER OF TARGETED MEDIA RELEASES:

A total of **19 media releases** were distributed for the month of **November**.

A total of **37 media releases** were distributed for the month of **December**.

PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:

- On November 23, 2022, a "Fraud Awareness" release was issued along with upcoming seminar dates and locations for public education.
- On November 18, 2022, the media/CSO attended the Blackburn News Sarnia location and provided radio interviews about winter driving tips, winter vehicle preparation and fraud awareness.
- November and December saw multiple posts in relation to Cops for Cans, Operation Christmas Tree and Toy drives throughout the county.
- The month of December saw multiple posts in relation to the OPP Festive RIDE season and results of those RIDE programs.
- On December 21, 2022, Winter driving tips and weather warnings were issued prior to a pending storm the following day.
- Lock-it or Lose-it messaging was posted on December 31, 2022, in response to a high-profile theft suspect who was wanted after being released on bail.
- Multiple road closures due to fatal collisions or weather were posted.

OTHER NEWS:

- The Lambton CSO has been providing content to the Sarnia Lambton Crime Stoppers to showcase crime in the area with their "Crime of the Week" segment both on the SLCS website and radio broadcasts weekly.
- The Lambton CSO has been presenting the OPP KIDS program at area schools during this reporting session.
- An alert was posted on all OPP West Region social media accounts after a suspect colliding with police vehicles while attempting to escape.
- A new West Region OPP Instagram account has been created, opening new avenues to reach end users. The Lambton CSO continues to post on all platforms. @ontarioprovincialpolicewest

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS - NOVEMBER / DECEMBER 2022

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during November and December. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions.

NOVEMBER 2022

Petrolia-17-year-old female reporting her ex-boyfriend, 17 years old, assaulted her. The female went to the hospital with injuries, concussion, and bruises. Female later disclosed a historical sexual assault. Male was subsequently arrested/charged and later released to his father.

17-year-old male student from local high school received a threatening phone call from unknown caller. After further police investigation, revealed that the phone number belonged to a 14-year-old male youth residing in Sarnia. Youth was spoken to by Police and diverted by way of verbal warning. Guardian was spoken to/informed at the time the warning was issued.

17-year-old female and 17-year-old boyfriend hanging out at local public school. Several youths arrived on location and a physical altercation ensued between numerous parties. Youths were located by Police. Youths and parents were spoken to. Youths were diverted by way of verbal warning due to having insufficient evidence to proceed with anything further.

17-year-old female and mother reporting to her local high school Vice Principal that an incident took place at their residence after school hours, already reported to Police. Parent of female wanted to make staff aware that a 50-year-old male is not welcomed to communicate or see their daughter. It was reported the male attended the female's workplace and uttered threats to a 3rd party that he was going to come after her. Male was contacted by School Resource Officer and warned to cease all contact with the female. Parents not wanting to press charges at this time.

Mother requesting police for assistance with her 14-year-old daughter being out of control in the home and damaging property. Police attended; situation was diffused. Youth was diverted by way of verbal warning.

Corunna-Third party complaint that his employee was harassed by three other youths while on his break. The youths involved were between the ages of 15-17 years of age. All youths were located by Police and diverted by way of verbal warning.

16-year-old female youth reporting that a male wearing all black with a ski mask and hood on pulled a knife on her at the local post office. After obtaining a description of the male from the female, Police were able to locate the 15-year-old male down the street. He was placed under investigative detention and searched incident to detention for weapons. SITD revealed brass knuckle folding knife. Male was arrested for assault with a weapon and weapons dangerous. Male was released to his mother.

Forest-Mother reporting that her 15-year-old son, who lives with a family friend threatened to attend her residence and smash her vehicle as well as attend fathers address and shoot him in the head.

Safety planning discussed with victims. Male was arrested the following day by the School Resource Officer without incident. The male was subsequently released to his grandfather.

For the month of November, there were 3 occurrences relating to mental health involving youths ages 15-16 years.

There were 6 motor vehicle collision occurrences during November involving youths ages 15-16 years of age.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 4 youths being warned under the HTA while 4 youths were issued Provincial Offence Notices under the HTA/CAIA.

DECEMBER 2022

Petrolia- 14-year-old female student engaged in a physical altercation with a 17-year-old male. Female stated male was previously charged with sex offences involving her cousin and was just getting back at the male. After further Police investigation, female/father were spoken to, and female was diverted to a community program (Sarnia-Lambton Rebound).

Ongoing issues between friends and fellow students at local high school, 14 years of age. All parties involved were suspended from school for their actions. Not criminal in nature. Parents and youth spoken to.

Forest- Trouble with youth-involving two males aged 14 and 16 years old pushing over Christmas decorations at a local park. Minor damage caused. Both students and parents spoken to. Youths diverted by verbal warning/community program through Sarnia-Lambton Rebound.

Corunna-14-year-old male spoken to by Police for uttering threats over social media. Youth and parents spoken to. Male diverted by way of verbal warning.

Brooke-Alvinston- 17-year-old male party had been speaking via social media with a female party. Female party convinced male to send photographs of him flexing his abs and his groin area, which was covered in clothing. The male forwarded these images and then discovered that it was not a female, rather a male, who then began extorting him for money. The 17-year-old male sent \$476.00 in iTunes gift cards, as well as PayPal payments. The male party wanted to make police aware of the situation only. Unable to obtain any information about the suspect. Safety planning completed.

For the month of December, there were 3 occurrences relating to mental health and 3 occurrences relating to suicidal ideations, all involving youths ages 15-17 years.

There were 3 motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of December, involving youths ages 15-16 years of age.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 3 youths being warned under the HTA while 1 youths was issued Provincial Offence Notices under the HTA.

COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT NOVEMBER/DECEMBER

During the months of November & December 2022 Lambton CSCU investigated **13** occurrences.

Lambton CSCU members laid a total of **64** charges

- Lambton CSCU wrote 10 warrants for a drug trafficking and property related investigations. The unit completed 5 warrant service entries.
- Lambton CSCU executed a section 11 CDSA Search Warrant in Warwick Twp. Persons Charged: 1 – Charges: 9. Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking (x2), Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, Unauthorized possession of a weapon, Breaches of Release Order. Police located 26 grams of Cocaine, 7 grams of Fentanyl, recovered a stolen ATV and several prohibited weapons.
- Lambton CSCU executed a section 11 CDSA Search Warrant in Lambton Shores.
 - Persons Charged: 1 – Charges laid – 3.
 - Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking – Fentanyl and Unauthorized Possession of Ammunition.
 - Police located 45 grams of Fentanyl and other drug paraphernalia.
- Lambton CSCU had been investigating a multi-jurisdictional trailer theft and fraud ring for several months that came to a conclusion. Last report we advised,
 - Persons arrested – 2, Persons charged – 2, Charges laid - 65.
 - A third person has also been charged with 20 charges in relation to Trafficking in Stolen Goods over \$5000, Make Forged Document, Fraudulent Concealment, Destroying VIN, Deal in Forged Document.
 - In total 19 trailers and 1 UTV were recovered, with a total value of \$240,000 in recovered property that has been returned to their rightful owners.
- Lambton CSCU executed a section 11 CDSA Search Warrant in Lambton Shores.
 - Persons Arrested – 2, Persons Charged – 2, Charges - 9.
 - Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking x 3 (Fentanyl, Cocaine, Methamphetamine), Unauthorized Possession of a Weapon, Possession of Property Obtained by Crime.
 - Search revealed 88 grams of Cocaine, 15 grams of Fentanyl, 8 grams of Methamphetamine, other pills and stolen property.
- Lambton CSCU executed a section 487 Search Warrant on Walpole Island in relation to a Break and Enter with stolen firearms.
 - Persons Arrested -1, Persons Charged -1, Charges - 6.
 - Unauthorized Possession of a Firearm, Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, several breach of conditions and a small quantity of controlled substances.
 - The stolen gun safe was located, however the stolen firearms were not.
- Lambton CSCU executed a section 487 Search Warrant in Parkhill in relation to a B&E Theft from Lambton Shores.
 - Persons Arrested – 1, Persons Charged – 1, Charges - 3.
 - Possession of Property Obtained by Crime (x4). There was much property seized from three counties – Lambton, Middlesex and Huron. This was great collaboration of a 3 CSCU's determining and tracking down the stolen property and returning to their rightful owners.

- Lambton CSCU assisted in the investigation of several overdose investigations.
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis.
- Lambton CSCU had one member seconded to the Provincial Joint Force Cannabis Enforcement Team (PJFCET) during most of this timeframe.

- Members of the Lambton County Crime Unit preparing for trial R vs Evan WOLFE. Homicide on the Kettle & Stoney Point First Nation. The accused in this matter remains in custody.
- Crime investigating a robbery at the Arkona GOCO station. Person of Interest has been identified.

DECEMBER 2022

- Trial for Ravenswood Home Invasion. Two accused convicted on all charges. Sentencing to take place early 2023.
- Three reported sexual assault cases investigated.
- 10 sudden deaths investigated. One infant death, all non-suspicious.
- Crime Unit is involved in a multi-jurisdictional homicide. Case files being disclosed to the Crown Attorney through multiple rounds.
- 4 criminal harassment investigations conducted.

FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.

CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:

The OPP's Citizen Self Reporting system allows you to submit a report from your computer or mobile device without going to an OPP detachment. All submissions will be sent directly to the OPP and reviewed by an officer. You may be contacted to provide more information. You must have a valid e-mail address in order to submit a report.

Use this system to report:

- Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
- Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
- Theft under \$5,000
- Driving Complaint

DO NOT use this system:

- If the occurrence is an emergency
- If the occurrence happened outside of OPP jurisdiction
- If there are any identifiable suspects
- If anyone was injured
- If the occurrence involves a weapon
- If the occurrence involves any damage to a motor vehicle due to an actual or apparent collision, including fail to remain collisions
- If the occurrence involves a break and enter to a place (e.g. unlawful entry and theft from a house, a building or a structure)
- If the occurrence involves drugs or gambling (including lottery tickets)
- If the occurrence involves a passport
