CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



Drugs Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non- criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2 Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.


Property Crime Violations This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

Statutes & Acts Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

Traffic Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

Violent Crimes The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.



Community Safety /Media Relations

July and August 2022

Objectives of the CSO/Media Relations

- Distribute media releases in relation to the BIG4 corporately driven driving behaviours; impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving and lack of seatbelt use.
- Seek community involvement by utilizing media releases with regard to property crimes such as break and enter, theft, mischief, drugs and wanted persons; with proven success.
- Engage with community partners to deliver educational programs on topics such as fraud, internet safety, youth and the law and drug awareness.
- Work collaboratively with the Lambton Crime Unit, Community Street Crimes Unit, Operational Analyst and Sarnia-Lambton Crime Stoppers.
- Use social media to help promote upcoming OPP events
- Work closely with the Auxiliary Unit to assist in any upcoming events

NUMBER OF TARGETED MEDIA RELEASES:

A total of 24 **media releases** were distributed for the month of **July**.

A total of 13 media releases were distributed for the month of August.

PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:

- On July 13, the CSO provided coverage for Tim Horton's Camp Day and showcased the officers who took part at multiple locations though the county.
- On July 14, 'Lock it or Lose it' messaging was posted, to help prevent theft from unlocked vehicles.
- On July 20, the CSO attended the Wyoming library and conducted a presentation to parents on 'Internet safety for children.'
- The CSO arranged for two separate presentations at an EarlyON center in Sarnia. The OPP Marine unit and K9 unit spoke to the children in the program. SPS was requested prior to OPP involvement but did not wish to take part.
- A preparedness reminder was posted on July 20 after strong winds began causing issues for swimmers on Lake Huron.
- The 'Big Squeeze' fundraiser was held on Aug 3, and OPP participants were showcased via social media.
- Two separate RIDE SMART cycling education programs were organized during this reporting period. The program educates children, grades 4-7 on safety equipment and safe cycling, teaching them skills like emergency braking, controlled turning, hand signals and obstacle crossing.

OTHER NEWS

- The Lambton CSO has been providing content to the Sarnia Lambton Crime Stoppers to showcase crime in the area with their "Crime of the Week" segment both on the SLCS website and radio broadcasts weekly.
- The CSO continues to broadcast emergency road closure information on social media platforms, to efficiently reach the greatest audience.
- On July 22, a reminder was posted for the public to contact police at the onset of suspicious activity, to facilitate an effective investigation.
- The Lambton CSO has been actively building and improving relationships with local, regional, and international news outlets through email correspondence and phone interviews.



SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS OVERVIEW

JULY / AUGUST 2022

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during July and August. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions.

July 2022

Enniskillen Township – A 12- and 17-year-old have had several issues/calls with their 40 year old father with several mental health issues. The 40-year-old father is known to police and when the father is not on his medications, he can be violent towards police and others. Children will be staying at mothers' home until father decides to take his meds.

Corunna – Several youths walking around the neighborhood at early hours of the morning, knocking on several doors. Police found 3 youths and they were given a stern warning.

Corunna – Two 17-year old's from the United States were on a floaty when they found themselves floating towards the Canadian border. OPP Marine unit picked up the two 17-year old's and brought them back to the United States of America.

Camlachie – A father and his 17-year-old high functioning autistic son were swimming in the lake when the father lost track of his son. Further investigation found that the 17 year old was actually the caller and had thought his father had drowned, and ran to get help. All parties were found safe.

Thedford – A 15 year old was driving erratically in a Mustang at high rate of speeds. The vehicle was stopped and the 15 year old advised that he did not have any license and the father did not know he had taken the vehicle. The 15 year old was charged with Stunt driving and Drive motor vehicle – No licence.

Grand Bend – Several youths' ages 15 to 18 were walking along the main strip, when one of the kids threw a rock at the glass railing at the Growling Gator restaurant, causing the glass railing to shatter. The owner identified the kids, and the kids were later found with a "No Swimming" sign that they had stolen from the main beach area. The owner did not wish to proceed with charges due to the youth's age and due to not positively identifying the youths.

There were 6 occurrences in the month of July with youth and suicidal thoughts and or attempts

There were 5 motor vehicle collisions during the Month of July involving 16 and 17 youths.

August 2022

Petrolia – Several youths, ages 15-16, were sitting at the Pavilion near the Petrolia Arena when 3 youths, all wearing face coverings, approached the youths and sprayed them with a fire extinguisher. The youths were identified and charged with assault and released on a Form 10.

Forest – A 15-year-old male was found taking pictures of other 15-year-old females. Police questioned the youth and he advised that "it put him in heat". The females and parents wanted this documented for any further police involvement.

Forest – A 15-year-old youth was unlocking his bicycle outside of North Lambton Secondary School when he was approached by an older man wanting to steal his bike. The 15-year-old pushed the male off in defense and rode off. The male was never identified.

Point Edward – 13- and 14-year-old females were on Omegle (Omegle is a site where it connects people from around the world via video to others with your interests). While on the site, the females connected with an older male (approx. 20 years old) who asked them to crawl in a sexy way, and "twerk". The females refused, disconnected the call, and told their parents. The male was not found and could possibly be from another country.

There were 3 occurrences in the month of August with youth and suicidal thoughts and or attempts.

There were 3 motor vehicle collisions during the Month of August involving 16- and 17-year-old youths.

COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT JULY/AUGUST

- During the months of July & August 2022 Lambton CSCU investigated 15 occurrences
- Lambton CSCU members laid a total of 16 charges
- Lambton CSCU wrote 7 warrants, for drug and fatal motor vehicle collision investigations. The unit completed 6 warrant service entries
- Lambton CSCU executed a S.11 CDSA Search Warrant in relation to Project McNulty. Persons arrested: 5 –
 Persons Charged: 1 Charges: 2. Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking CDSA 5(2), Fail to Comply with
 Undertaking S.145(4)(a). Accused was on previously released for Trafficking Controlled Substances. Lambton
 CSCU & CKPS has conducted warrant entry previously at this residence 2 months prior. Male party selling CDSA
 to Walpole Island dealers and users. Seized 164.8 grams of Methamphetamine, \$2130 cash, digital scales and
 cellphone. Another occupant in the residence was wanted by CKPS, they returned for her
- Lambton CSCU was requested by Command Staff to assist with Fatal MVC investigation with warrant/production order preparation. Lambton CSCU wrote 1 warrant and 4 production orders for this investigation
- Lambton CSCU member conducting follow up, observed a vehicle driving dangerous. Requested uniform assistance to stop the vehicle, the vehicle failed to stop. Through surveillance video we were able to determine identity of male driver. He has extensive criminal record, flagged for drugs and firearms. Male charged with several offences
- Lambton CSCU continues to assist Lambton Crime Unit with Homicide Investigation, in various capacities
- Lambton CSCU assisted Essex CSCU & Elgin-Middlesex CSCU with several warrant entries and searching at those warrants
- Lambton CSCU continues to assist Walpole Island Police Service with intelligence gathering related to drug trafficking pertaining to the State of Emergency issued as a result of the high number of opioid drug related overdoses
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis

MAJOR CRIME UNIT – JULY / AUGUST 2022

- Members of the Lambton County Crime Unit continue with a cold case historic death investigation
- Crime members actively investigating an unsolved homicide on the Kettle & Stony Point First Nation
- Crime Unit is involved in a multi-jurisdictional homicide. 8 have been charged in relation to the murder investigation. The crime unit is now working with the Crown with respect to the court processes
- The crime unit is heavily engaged with the Crown's office preparing for court etc. regarding the double homicide which occurred at the end of December
- Lambton Crime continues to actively investigate the 1st degree murder that occurred at Marthaville Conservation
- 16 sexual assaults were reported during the time frame. 9 resulted in charges, 3 were investigated with insufficient evidence to proceed, 4 resulted in the victim declining to lay charges
- Lambton had 10 sudden deaths over July and August 2022. 2 were investigated by crime. One being the death of a child under 4 and the other a suspected overdose
- Lambton Crime is investigating a missing person under the direction of Criminal Investigations Branch. The investigation is ongoing
- Lambton Crime in conjunction with the Ontario Fire Marshall is investigating an arson damage to property in Lambton Shores. Investigation is ongoing
- Lambton Crime in preparation for Ravenswood home invasion trial which occurred in Lambton Shores

TRAFFIC

- During this reporting period OPP members conducted 342 traffic enforcement initiatives
- Nine Hundred and Forty-nine (949) PON's were issued and Five Hundred and Twenty-six (526) written warnings
- There were 202 motor vehicle collisions
- Sixty (60) RIDE Programs were conducted
- Thirty-one (31) Impaired Drivers were arrested

CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:

You have the option to report select occurrences to the OPP from your computer or mobile device using the OPP's <u>Citizen</u> <u>Self Reporting</u> system.

Use this system to report:

- 1. Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- 2. Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- 3. Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- 4. Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
- 5. Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
- 6. Theft under \$5,000
- 7. Driving Complaint

FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
