CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



Drugs Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non-criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2 Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

Property Crime Violations This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

Statutes & Acts Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

Traffic Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.


Violent Crimes The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

- Work collaboratively with the Lambton Crime Unit, Community Street Crimes Unit, Operational Analyst and Sarnia-Lambton Crime Stoppers.
- Use social media to help promote upcoming OPP events.
- Work closely with the Auxiliary Unit to assist in any upcoming events.

NUMBER OF TARGETED MEDIA RELEASES:

A total of **21 media releases** were distributed for the month of **January**.

A total of **3 media releases** were distributed for the month of **February**. (The media officer was off for an extended time during the month of February)

PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:

- A media release was posted about the 'new to Lambton' Project Lifesaver equipment launch taking place soon.
- The CSO and SRO attended 'Cook with a Cop' event with students of the cooking class at LCCVI in Petrolia, which was showcased on social media.
- A release was posted regarding a high-profile wanted individual residing in Lambton County who was involved in severely damaging a police vehicle while fleeing from police.
- A follow-up release was posted after the above turned himself in as a result of the 'Wanted' post.



Break-ins have a negative impact on everyone involved. The Ontario Provincial Police would like to help you protect your property, your home and yourself against crime.

This brochure provides information to help keep your home and property secure.

Cottages and seasonal homes are most vulnerable to property crime during fall, winter and spring when they are not being used by property owners.



SAFEGUARDING YOUR HOME

- ✓ Secure windows and doors with shutters.
- ✓ Trim trees and shrubs so doors and windows are visible from the roadway.
- ✓ Remove valuables from property ie tools, electronics, personal items.
- Arrange for a permanent resident or keyholder to check your property; leave your contact information with that person.
- ✓ Consider using motion sensor lights to illuminate the exterior of your residence/cottage.
- ✓ Consider an alarm system.
- Avoid posting information on social media advising of when you will be away or any vacation plans.
- ✓ Know your neighbours.
- Eliminate objects from around your property that would be used to break in.
- ✓ Don't leave firearms or weapons at the residence/cottage.
- If you are leaving vehicles, make sure they are winterized, secure and disabled. For snow machines, remove track and hide keys. Ensure boats are covered and locked and outboard motors locked and slightly disassembled. Disable ATVs. Leave nothing on trailers unless it is locked or disabled.
- Take photos and record serial numbers of anything of value left behind.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS – JANUARY / FEBRUARY 2023

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during January and February. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions.

JANUARY 2023

Petrolia-Two youths 15 and 17 years of age made it onto the roof of a Petrolia elementary school and caused mischief to the roof vents. Police, SRO, and parents were engaged. Both youths were diverted by way of community programming-referred to Sarnia-Lambton Rebound.

Petrolia Tim Hortons-3 male youths (ages 15 and 16) attended this location and on two occasions disrupted the men's washroom. OPP members were engaged. The youths were identified and diverted by way of a verbal warning.

Male youth aged 13 from the Petrolia group home, engaged in a verbal confrontation with another resident subsequently brandishing a pocketknife. Lambton OPP responded to the incident. The male was arrested and charged with assault w/ a weapon x2 and alternate living arrangements were made with the assistance of CAS.

Sarnia Police requesting the assistance of Lambton SRO in locating a 15 yr. old female to relay a warning. Petrolia youth attended a Sarnia school and was involved in a physical altercation. Sarnia police investigation resulted in no charges being laid. Lambton SRO located the youth and issued a verbal warning.

Corunna-Elementary school requesting the assistance of SRO after finding a 12-year-old female student in possession of a cannabis vape on school premise. SRO attended a re-entry meeting at the school in the presence of the youth, parents, and principal. The youth was issued a verbal warning by Police/educational conversation had, followed by the school's internal discipline. (3-day suspension)

Plympton-Wyoming-Elementary school Principal requesting the assistance of SRO to speak to a 10-year-old male student regarding touching other students in an inappropriate manner. Not sexual in nature. Police attended a re-entry meeting where the youth and parents were spoken to. The male was diverted by way of verbal warning. Safety measures were discussed/implemented within the school. CAS was subsequently engaged.

Petrolia - Family dispute involving a 15-year-old female and parents. Female displayed severe behaviour issues and became upset when mother took her bongs away and removed the TV from her room as a means of discipline. Police attended the household confirmed all was calm, no safety concerns. Available resources shared with the parent.

For the month of January, there were 5 occurrences relating to mental health involving youths ranging from ages 10-16 years. 1 in which was an MHA apprehension and 1 was a voluntary metal health apprehension.

There were 4 motor vehicle collisions occurrences during the month of January involving all youths 17 years of age.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 5 youths being warned under the HTA/CAIA while 4 youths were issued Provincial Offence Notices under the HTA.

FEBRUARY 2023

Lambton Shores – A 17-year-old youth was charged with providing a false statement with regards to a criminal investigation.

Forest- A 14-year-old student made suicidal comments to family members by his cell phone and then left the Forest High School during school hours. School staff were concerned and contacted the OPP. Several officers were engaged in the search including Patrol officers, Emergency Response team members and school resource officers. The youth was located in a farmer's field approximately 12 kilometers from the Secondary school. The youth was transported to the Sarnia hospital for a psychiatric assessment.

Corunna- A 15-year-old youth was found to be intoxicated and showing signs of suicidal behavior. The youth was apprehended under the Mental Health Act.

Corunna – a 10-year-old student left their school and began throwing rocks at the building. The student then made several suicidal comments prior to leaving the area. A search of the area was conducted, and the youth was found and brought to the hospital for a psychiatric assessment.

Plympton-Wyoming – A 14-year-old youth was operating an ATV on a roadway and was struck by a motor vehicle. The 14-year-old was transported to the hospital with non life threating injuries. At the time of this report the investigation is still ongoing.

For the month of February, there were **4** occurrences relating to mental health and relating to suicidal ideations, all involving youths ages **10-17 years**.

There were **4** motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of February, involving youths ages **15-17 years of age.**

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in several youths being warned/Charge under the Highway Traffic Act.




COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT JANUARY / FEBRUARY

During the months of January & February 2023 Lambton CSCU investigated 12 occurrences.

Lambton CSCU members laid a total of 12 charges

- Lambton CSCU wrote 4 warrants for a drug trafficking and property related investigations. The unit completed 2 warrant service entries.
- Lambton CSCU observed in plain view a stolen trailer at a St. Clair Twp property. The owner
 provided consent to search and police located two stolen trailers, a stolen tractor and a
 stolen motorcycle. The value of the recovered property was approximately \$120,000.
- Lambton CSCU assisted Walpole Island Police Service with drug trafficking occurrence. A significant amount of Fentanyl and other drugs were seized.
- Lambton CSCU assisted other units with warrant entries in Essex County and Project Coyote takedown in Belleville.
- Lambton CSCU assisted in the investigation of overdose death investigation.
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis.



MAJOR CRIME UNIT – JANUARY / FEBRUARY 2023

JANUARY 2023

- Crime members and OPP Criminal Investigations Branch still investigating Andrew CHUTE homicide at the Marthaville Conservation homicide.
- Crime members and CIB actively investigating an unsolved homicide of David Oliver on the Kettle & Stoney Point First Nation.
- Crime investigated incident involving one year old who fell into a pool at unlicensed daycare.
 Child was VSA till revived and transported to hospital. A resource heavy investigation was completed resulting in daycare operator being charged with criminal negligence cause bodily harm.
- Three non-suspicious death investigations completed.
- Two reported sexual assaults cases investigated.
- Six fraud investigations.
- Two Criminal Harassment investigations completed.
- One extremely complicated parental abduction investigation resulting in charges to parent of abduction and disobey court order.

FEBRUARY 2023

- One aggravated assault charge laid in Grand Bend.
- Two sexual assaults cases investigated.
- Seven sudden deaths investigated.
- Crime Unit is involved in a multi-jurisdictional homicide. Case files being disclosed to the crown attorney through multiple rounds.
- 4 criminal harassment investigations conducted.
- Crime Unit continues to investigate missing female Deana Timms.
- Crime Unit continues to see trend of deaths because of fentanyl use.

Always Ride Sober

A police officer can stop ORV and ATV operators either on or off-road to demand a variety of tests to determine impairment by alcohol and/or drugs. If you fail any of these tests, or refuse to take them, you can be suspended immediately from driving and face criminal impaired driving or related charges.

Rules of the Road

ATVs/ORVs travelling along a road must have all their lights on and be driven in the same direction of traffic on the shoulder of the road. If the shoulder is unsafe or not wide enough, an ATV/ORV can be driven on the travelled portion of the road.

Permitted ATVs/ORVs can travel on:

- Highways 500 to 899
- many 7000-series highways
- highways with low traffic volumes


ATVs/ORVs cannot travel on:

- 400-series highways
- I the Queen Elizabeth Way
- Sections of the Trans-Canada Highway

Please refer to Ontario Regulation 316/03 for a list of provincial highways where on-road ATV/ORV use is:

- ☑ Prohibited → see Schedule A
- ☑ Permitted → see Schedule B

This is a guide only. For information on the legal requirements of driving an ATV/ORV in Ontario, consult the Off-Road Vehicles Act and the Highway Traffic Act.



What you need to know to operate an all-terrain vehicle (ATV) and an off-road vehicle (ORV) in Ontario



On-road Riding

Only an ATV/ORV that meets current standards and other equipment-related requirements can be used on the road. It must be insured under a motor vehicle liability policy.

ATVs/ORVs that meet these requirements can travel along certain provincial highways and municipal roads. Check with the local municipality for access on their road before heading out.

Who can ride

For on-road riding, an ATV/ORV driver must:

- · hold at least a valid G2 or M2 licence
- · wear a seat belt, where provided
- · travel at speeds less than the posted speed limit
- · carry the vehicle registration permit or a copy

For on-road riding, an ATV/ORV passenger must wear a seat belt or use foot rests, when applicable.

An ATV/ORV driver must be at least:







eight years old

for on-road riding

A passenger on an ATV/ORV must be at least

8

unless directly supervised by an adult or while driving on land occupied by the ATV/ORV owner

ATV/ORV Speed Limits

ATVs/ORVs on the road must travel at speeds less than the posted speed limit:

- o no more than 20 km/h on roads with a posted speed limit of 50 km/h or less
- o no more than 50 km/h on roads with a posted speed limit greater than 50 km/h

Municipalities may set lower speed limits or additional rules for ATVs/ORVs.



Off-road Riding

An ORV must be registered and display a licence plate (*except in exempt areas like far northern Ontario). It must be insured under a motor vehicle liability policy.

These requirements also apply to other types of ORVs including two-up ATVs, side-by-side ORVs and utility terrain

Who can ride

For off-road riding, an ATV/ORV driver must carry the ATV/ORV's registration permit or a copy.

The driver can directly cross a highway on an ATV/ORV where permitted only if:

- it's registered + displays a licence plate
- it's insured under a motor vehicle liability policy
- the driver is at least 16 years old and has a valid driver's licence of any class

FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.

CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:

The OPP's <u>Citizen Self Reporting</u> system allows you to submit a report from your computer or mobile device without going to an OPP detachment. All submissions will be sent directly to the OPP and reviewed by an officer. You may be contacted to provide more information. You must have a valid e-mail address in order to submit a report.

Use this system to report:

- Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
- Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
- Theft under \$5,000
- Driving Complaint

DO NOT use this system:

- If the occurrence is an emergency
- If the occurrence happened outside of OPP jurisdiction
- If there are any identifiable suspects
- If anyone was injured
- If the occurrence involves a weapon
- If the occurrence involves any damage to a motor vehicle due to an actual or apparent collision, including fail to remain collisions
- If the occurrence involves a break and enter to a place (e.g. unlawful entry and theft from a house, a building or a structure)
- If the occurrence involves drugs or gambling (including lottery tickets)
- If the occurrence involves a passport
