# CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



**Drugs** Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

**Drug Possession** Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

**Operational** calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non- criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

**Operational 2** Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

**Other Criminal Code Violations** The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.


**Property Crime Violations** This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

**Statutes & Acts** Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

*Traffic* Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

**Violent Crimes** The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

# **Community Safety / Media Relations**

# May and June 2023

## **Objectives of the CSO/Media Relations**

- Distribute media releases in relation to the BIG4 corporately driven driving behaviours; impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving and lack of seatbelt use.
- Seek community involvement by utilizing media releases with regard to property crimes such as break and enter, theft, mischief, drugs and wanted persons; with proven success.
- Engage with community partners to deliver educational programs on topics such as fraud, internet safety, youth and the law and drug awareness.
- Work collaboratively with the Lambton Crime Unit, Community Street Crimes Unit, Operational Analyst and Sarnia-Lambton Crime Stoppers.
- Use social media to help promote upcoming OPP events
- Work closely with the Auxiliary Unit to assist in any upcoming events

## NUMBER OF TARGETED MEDIA RELEASES:

A total of **23 media releases** were distributed for the month of **May**. A total of **37 media releases** were distributed for the month of **June**.

## **PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:**

- May 10<sup>th</sup> was McHappy day throughout the region, arrangements were made for officers to attend local McDonalds in the county.
- During the month of May, the CSO attended St. Joseph's School in Corunna to deliver the OPP Kids program to three separate classrooms.
- The CSO has also been engaged to meet with all rural credit unions following recent robberies.
- The CSO met with the staff of Big Brothers/Big Sisters Sarnia and discussed safety planning for dealing with difficult or aggressive individuals.
- Social media posts were created after a 'sextortion' scam, educating the public about sending images to unknown individuals.
- Social media messaging sent out about updated stunt driving legislation after a local student was charged for performing a stunt in a parking lot.

## OTHER NEWS:

- The Lambton CSO has been providing content to the Sarnia Lambton Crime Stoppers to showcase crime in the area with their "Crime of the Week" segment both on the SLCS website and radio broadcasts weekly.
- The Lambton CSO has been actively building and improving relationships with local, regional, and international news outlets through email correspondence and phone interviews.
- The CSO attended WRHQ for the week of May 8-11 to instruct the OPP media course.

# SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS OVERVIEW

# **MAY / JUNE 2023**

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during May and June. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including youth and the law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions.

#### **MAY 2023**

**Corunna**- Police responded to reports of youths throwing rocks at a school window and ultimately shattering it. Youth responsible was identified. The School Resource Officer was engaged and made appropriate referrals to community programming as means of diversion.

**Plympton-Wyoming-** Mother reporting that her son is out of control and destroying the house. Police attended and deescalated the situation. Appropriate resources provided by Police to the family.

**Petrolia** – Dumpster fire behind local high school after school hours- deemed suspicious. Suspects unable to be identified due to lack of evidence.

Female youth advised her boyfriends ex is harassing her via social media, stating she was going to assault her. All parties spoken to and warned by Police to cease all communication. Youths educated on the criminal act of harassment/uttering threats.

Male youth 16 y/o, reporting being blackmailed after sending intimate images to an unknown snapchat user. After nude Images were sent, user then requested \$500 or they would leak the photographs to the victims friends and family. Victim did not provide payment. The photographs were distributed to some family and friends by fraudulent snapchat account.

Several youths at the local baseball diamond, where one youth stood on the dugout roof taking photographs. Cement roof gives way and youth falls through, landing on the ground as cement crashes down on top of him causing minor injuries. Superficial scrape to forehead and black eye. Taken to hospital by bystander. All youths spoken to by Police.

13-year-old female spoken to by Police and educated on the dangers of social media chats, online relationships after being caught by classroom teacher chatting with an unknown male online while at school. Community programming supports offered and accepted.

**St Clair Township-15**-year-old female returned home and found out that her mother took all the items she had stolen and threw them out. The youth became angry and lashed out at mom by striking her and making a mess of the living room/bathroom. Police attended and deescalated the situation. Youth went to stay with another family member to allow things to calm down. Appropriate resources provided to the family by Police.

**Forest-**Principal of local high school requesting Police assistance for an out of control 15-year-old male. Police removed the youth from the school without incident. Youth upset over an incident that had transpired over the weekend at a local campground. School Resource Officer spoke to and warned all youth involved over instigating a possible fight.

Assault between two male youths ages 12-13, at a local elementary school. No injuries reported. Both parties were warned by Police as a mean of diversion.

**Thedford-**15-year-old youth assaults 15-year-old male with a knife. Stabs him in the back. Superficial wound. Female was arrested and released to her parents pending a future Court date.

For the month of May, there were **5** occurrences relating to mental health involving youths ranging from ages **13-17** years.

There was **1** motor vehicle collisions occurrence during the month of May involving a youth **17** years of age.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in **6** youths being warned under the HTA while **6** youths were issued Provincial Offence Notices under the Highway Traffic Act.

It should also be noted that there were **5** other Provincial Offences notices given to youth. Most of these offences were related to alcohol in Grand Bend.

#### JUNE 2023

**Grand Bend** – Staff of business caught a 17-year-old youth that had attempted to steal a pair of sunglasses. Item returned and youth was given a trespass notice for the store.

**Lambton Shores** A 17-year-old driver was stopped for a sobriety check as the vehicle was weaving in the drive lane. Open liquor was located in the vehicle. Three Provincial offence notices issued, and the driver's licence was suspended for 3 days.

**Grand Bend** – A 17-year-old youth was found to be publicly intoxicated on the streets of Grand Bend. The youth was arrested and held in cells until sober. The youth was given two Provincial Offence Notices prior to leaving the detachment.

**Forest** – A 17-year-old youth was caught performing a stunt using his vehicle in the Forest Curling Club parking lot. The youth was charged with performing a stunt under the Highway traffic Act. The youth was given a court appearance and his vehicle was impounded. Since the date of the incident the youth has shown great remorse and asked his high school if he would be able to speak to classmates in a lecture setting. The youth was given permission to speak to other students in order to prevent other youths from making a similar mistake. The youth has spoken to several classes and is promoting traffic safety.

**St Clair Township** – Officers responded to a 16-year-old holding a steak knife to his own throat. Officers deescalated the situation and transported the youth to Bluewater Health where the youth was assessed under the Mental health Act.

**Watford** - A 16-year-old was assaulted at what was called the LCCVI prom party (LCCVI is not affiliated). The assault was considered minor. Alcohol was a factor in this occurrence.

**Corunna** - An 11-year-old youth assaulted their teacher. The youth is known to police and has Mental health issues. The school and psychological advisers are working with the youth.

**Point Edward-** Domestic-14-year-old male youth assaulted 14-year-old female at school, punching her in the back. School internal investigation completed. No injuries to report. Police spoke to all parties involved including parents. Male was diverted to Sarnia-Lambton Rebound.

For the month of June, there were **3** occurrences relating to mental health/suicidal ideations, all involving youths ages **13-17 years.** 

There were **2** motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of June, involving youths ages **16-17 years of age**.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in **4** youths being warned and **6** Provincial Offence Notices given under the Highway Traffic Act. Youths ranged from 16-18 years of age.

It should also be noted that there were **17** other Provincial Offences notices given to youth. Most of these offences were related to alcohol in Grand Bend.

# **COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT MAY/JUNE 2023**

- During the months of May and June 2023 Lambton CSCU investigated 14 occurrences.
- Lambton CSCU members laid a total of 31 charges.
- Lambton CSCU wrote 11 warrants for a drug trafficking investigations. The unit completed 7 warrant service entries.
- Lambton CSCU executed a S.11 CDSA Search Warrant in relation to Project Yellow. Persons Charged: 1 Oxycodone seized in addition to \$26,000 in bulk currency. Crown law civil investigation underway into bulk currency of cocaine trafficker.
- Lambton CSCU recovered \$15,000 in stolen property.
- Lambton CSCU conducted surveillance on a local drug trafficker recently convicted of trafficking and sentenced to house arrest. CSCU conducted a vehicle stop in partnership with Anishinabek Police, arrested the trafficker, and located quantities of meth, fentanyl, hydromorphone, scales, and packaging materials. Charges laid and drug trafficker is now serving the remainder of their sentence in the Southwest Detention Facility.
- Lambton CSCU assisted the Lambton Crime Unit with a search warrant execution on Walpole Island related to firearms.
- Lambton CSCU assisted Essex CSCU & Elgin-Middlesex CSCU with several warrant entries and searching at those warrants.
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis.
- Lambton CSCU assisted the Provincial Biker Enforcement Unit with Project Derailleur, a multi location takedown, Lambton CSCU conducted an entry/search at a residence in Strathroy.
- Lambton CSCU assisted the Provincial Joint Force Cannabis Enforcement Team (PJFCET) with a large grown op takedown.
- Lambton CSCU assisted the Provincial Guns and Gangs Unit with a multi location takedown in Essex County. Lambton CSCU conducted an entry/search at a residence in Leamington.
- Lambton CSCU continues to share intelligence reports with neighbouring police services.
- Lambton CSCU assisted the Provincial Operations Intelligence Bureau and Indigenous Intelligence Unit with mobile surveillance in this time frame.

# TRAFFIC - MAY / JUNE 2023

- During this reporting period OPP members conducted 373 traffic enforcement initiatives
- Eight Hundred and Sixty-three (863) PON's were issued and Seven Hundred and Eighty-two (782) written warnings
- There were 183 motor vehicle collisions
- One Hundred and Four (104) RIDE Programs were conducted
- Twenty-seven (27) Impaired Drivers were arrested

## CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:

You have the option to report select occurrences to the OPP from your computer or mobile device using the OPP's <u>Citizen Self Reporting</u> system.

Use this system to report:

- 1. Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- 2. Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- 3. Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- 4. Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
- 5. Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
- 6. Theft under \$5,000
- 7. Driving Complaint

## FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
